Claire Wong

Claire is a co-founder and Joint Artistic Director of Checkpoint Theatre, Singapore. She graduated with a Master of Fine Arts (Theatre Arts) from Columbia University, New York. I As an actress, Claire was most recently seen on stage in Checkpoint Theatre's Cogito, written and directed by Huzir Sulaiman, and a commission of the Singapore Arts Festival 2007. Last year, Claire acted in the Singapore feature film by Glen Goei, The Blue Mansion (opening in cinemas in October). Claire has performed in major international arts festivals and in cities such as Edinburgh, Berlin, Munich, Hamburg, Cologne, Copenhagen, New York City, Paris, Adelaide, Tokyo, Yokohama, Fukuoka, and Kuala Lumpur. Her stage credits include: Cogito, Atomic Jaya, Opiume (Checkpoint Theatre); Atomic Jaya (Five Arts Centre); Occupation (Straits Theatre Company); The Woman In A Tree On the Hill (Wild Rice); Lear, Desdemona, Madame Mao's Memories, Beauty World, Three Children, Mad Forest (Theatreworks). # As a director, she was nominated for Best Director in the Singapore's Life! Theatre Awards for the landmark production of the trilogy of plays by Eleanor Wong, Invitation To Treat (Mergers & Accusation, Wills & Secession, Jointly & Severably). She wrote and directed a television film, Project Peter, for Singapore's Arts Central channel. She recently co-wrote the screenplay The Unforgettable Rose Chan and is currently working on the screenplay of a historical film of the Rani of Jhansi Regiment of the Indian National Army.

Noorlinah Mohamed

Noorlinah is an actor, educator and advocate of the arts. As an actor, she has performed and toured extensively since 1988 with companies like TheatreWorks, Action Theatre, The Theatre Practice, The Necessary Stage, Wild Rice, Toy Factory Theatre Ensemble and Cake Theatre. Recalling Mother is her second project with Checkpoint Theatre after Cogito for the Singapore Arts Festival in 2007. 9 Noorlinah is also an arts educator who has developed numerous aesthetic education programmes in schools under the auspices of the NAC Artistin-School scheme. She lectures part-time at the National Institute of Education. She is also an advocate of the professional development and needs of actors and drama educators in Singapore. Noorlinah co-founded two professional bodies – the Association of Singapore Actors and Singapore Drama Educators Association. With the latter she served as its President from 2005 - 2009. During that time, she developed the youth and community arts festival, Celebrate Drama!, and led numerous arts-related community projects under the banner of SDEA Outreach Project, as well as professional development initiatives in collaboration with the Singapore Workforce Development Agency. ¶ Noorlinah is the recipient of several awards – Singapore Women's Weekly's Great Women of the Year Award (2005) and the JCCI Culture Award (2008) for her contributions to the arts. She was recently awarded the 9th Life! Theatre Award for Best Actress for her performance in Temple staged by Cake Theatre in 2008.

Huzir Sulaiman

A critically acclaimed dramatist and a 2007 Yale World Fellow, Huzir writes for theatre, film, television and newspapers. He directs for the stage and screen, and is a consultant for the arts and heritage sectors. He is currently working with design firm GSM as the Creative Director of the observation deck on Level 124 of the Burj Dubai, the tallest building in the world. If A co-founder and Joint Artistic Director of Checkpoint Theatre, Huzir also teaches playwriting at the National University of Singapore and mentors NUS Stage. If His collection Eight Plays is published by Silverfish Books. He will be seen later this year on screen as Detective Superintendent Suresh in the film The Blue Mansion. Forthcoming publications include the chapter on the arts in Readings on Development: Malaysia at 50, Malaysia 2057, published by Khazanah.

Grace Low

Recalling Mother is Grace's third production with Checkpoint Theatre after A Language Of Their Own (2006) and Cogito (2007). Grace's stage management credits include Theatreworks' The Flying Circus Project (2004); Boxing Day: A Tsunami Project (2005) by The Necessary Stage; The Admiral's Odyssey (2005) by Action Theatre; Animal Vegetable Mineral (2005) by CAKE Theatrical Productions; A Twist of Fate (2005), Man Of Letters (2006) and Much Ado About Nothing (2009) by Singapore Repertory Theatre; and Le Nozze di Figaro (2006) and Hey Figaro! The Barber of Seville (2007) by Singapore Lyric Opera. Her production management credits include Boom (2008), Avenue Q (2008) and The Crucible (2009) by Singapore Repertory Theatre.

Checkpoint Theatre was founded in 2002. Huzir Sulaiman and Claire Wong serve as its Joint Artistic Directors.

Checkpoint's past productions include: Occupation (a commission of the 2002 Singapore Arts Festival); Atomic Jaya (2003); Election Day (2004); Opiume (a co-commission of the 2004 Singapore Arts Festival and the Hong Kong New Visions Festival); A Language Of Their Own (2006); and Cogito (a commission of the 2007 Singapore Arts Festival).

Recalling Mother is the first in a series of chamber theatre performances by Checkpoint Theatre called the Home Theatre System. Based on personal stories about people, their relationships and their lives, the series celebrates the very best traditions of theatre-making. For audiences numbering no more than 80 or so, the performance venues themselves are intimate and personal - an art gallery, someone's living room, over a dinner table.

Our next production in this series, *Footage*, will be written by Huzir Sulaiman and will be staged in December, continuing our collaboration with Valentine Willie Fine Art.

Checkpoint Theatre is also pleased to be mentoring NUS Stage, a student theatre group under the auspices of the National University of Singapore's Centre For the Arts. In October, Huzir Sulaiman will direct an evening of short student plays. In March next year, Claire Wong will direct Faith Ng's wo(men), which will open the 2010 NUS Arts Festival and will star Neo Swee Lin, Lok Meng Chue and Patricia Toh.

Checkpoint is dedicated to furthering the renaissance in Singapore playwriting, and will continue to identify, nurture, and stage the works of the next wave of playwrights.
