About Three Children

Three Children was written in 1985 by Malaysian playwright Leow Puay Tin. The play is about three grown-up siblings — two sisters and a brother — who return to their childhood home on Kappan Road, Malacca, to confront their past. Eschewing a linear narrative, the three characters and a narrator race through a series of childrens' songs, games and sketches.

Thirty years ago, TheatreWorks staged *Three Children* in a directorial collaboration between its artistic director Ong Keng Sen and Five Art Centre founder Krishen Jit. For three months, the directors trained and devised with the cast, comprising Lok Meng Chue, Claire Wong, Lim Kay Tong and Neo Swee Lin. *Three Children* opened on 11 November 1988 at the Drama Centre to critical acclaim. *Three Children* returned in 1992 as a touring production with the directors, Lok and Wong, and joined by Loong Seng Onn and Tan Kheng Hua. This production toured to Singapore, Malaysia and Japan.

About Are You Game, Sau(dara)?

Are You Game, Sau(dara)? is created as a contemporary response to *Three Children*, a boundary-pushing 1988 play about childhood by Malaysian playwright Leow Puay Tin. Are You Game, Sau(dara)?comprises of two works.

The first piece, titled *Sau(dara)*, is devised by Singapore-based theatre company Bhumi Collective, and explores childhood, memory, and play. Its premise is based on the artistic team's own childhood experiences, while also incorporating scenes from the original script of *Three Children*. A work-in-progress version of this work was first presented in 2018 under Centre 42's The Vault programme, a platform that invites artists to create responses to past works in the theatre canon.

The second piece, *Are You Game?* is created by Malaysian director Fasyali Fadzly. This devised piece revolves around the idea of memories and identity seen through a contemporary Malaysian lens. This work in progress is semi-interactive, and seeks to playfully engage with audiences.

Are You Game, Sau(dara)? will be performed in English and Malay, with English surtitles provided at the Singapore staging.

"We're excited to embark on a new collaboration with Five Arts Centre. Through this co-presentation, we hope to explore new connections and approaches between independent artists, as well as between independent art centres. This deepening of relationship with Five Arts Centre, Bhumi Collective and Fasyali Fadzly is especially meaningful as Centre 42 has worked with each party on different occasions over the last two years," says Ma Yanling, Company Manager of Centre 42.

June Tan, producer with Five Art Centre, echoes this with: "It's exciting for us to see how a new way of archiving/recording is considered with responses by contemporary practitioners on text/performance strategies previously employed by the past production(s) of Leow Puay Tin's *Three Children*. Puay Tin and her work have had close relationships with Five Arts' members such as Krishen Jit to Chin San Sooi, Chee Sek Thim and others. We are curious and encouraged to see how we can expand this thread to include Fasyali, Amin, Centre 42 and the host of contemporary practitioners working on this double-bill, both on the Malaysian and Singaporean side."

Synopsis

Are You Game? is a devised piece that revolves around the idea of memories and identity seen through a contemporary Malaysian lens. This work-in-progress response to the original play *Three Children* is semi-interactive, and seeks to playfully engage with audiences.

Producer's notes

Ride, ride, ride, ride.... Riding into the jungle. Ride, ride, ride, ride.... On my horse, my faith.

This text accompanied me as an actor in the Chinese version of *Three Children from Petaling Street*, adapted from Puay Tin's *Three Children* as we toured this play to different places in Malaysia and to Macau. It gives me a great sense of connection and belonging, to be a Producer for this double-bill responses, and to know that these responses are touring. And perhaps that is the magic of Puay Tin's text and sensibility that we belong to a particular space of local dreams, memories and histories. And that space continues to move and develop into the contemporary. We would very much like to thank everybody involved in making this happen and are excited to "join forces" with our friends in Singapore. Please come join us and enjoy the ride!

Director's notes

A lot of question running through my head when I said yes to this project. How can I archive *Three Children* in a form of theatrical performance? How to respond to this phenomenal work I never watched? What is the thing I want to keep from the original play and why? Should I create something I am not familiar with?

Creating Are You Game is a unique process compare to my other plays. I was encouraged to work with artists who I never worked with. I knew all my actors beforehand but not like my any other projects which I already built our relationship over the years. For this project, it was really creating everything from scratch. Then, I met my actors and started researching together.

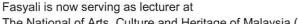
We composed our performance together. We failed. We asked ourselves again. Tried again. Questioned again until we all agreed that this is the thing we want to show. We tried so hard to find ways to respond to this play. We want to put everything that being said in *Three Children* in our performance. But, it was impossible. This play is so big and overwhelming we cannot do that. *Are You Game* really dragged me deep into a very challenging task and riddle.

While creating this work, I had this moment like if you play Scrabble, you have lot of high scoring alphabets, but you can't create any word out of it. I was in that moment a lot of time. I try to get high marks, but forget to just enjoy the beauty of the game, the beauty of the play.

I hope you enjoy watching this play as much I enjoy creating it. I can never get the right answer to all my questions and your curiosities. Therefore, I will keep asking the most important question to challenge myself: are you game, Fasyali?

Fasyali Fadzly is an educator, director, playwright and writer. He had written and directed his own plays such as *Teater Juta-Juta*, *Berani Mati*, *Kotak Hitam*, *Mati Hidup Kembali*, *Ingatan* and directed several plays from other playwrights. His theatrical works are staged in Malaysia and abroad such as Japan, Indonesia, Singapore, Canada and Czech Republic. He also writes theatre-related articles and reviews and was published in local and international web portal. Currently, he works for Malaysian theatre archive project, My Art Memory Project as a researcher with Kathy Rowland.

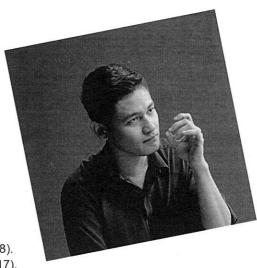

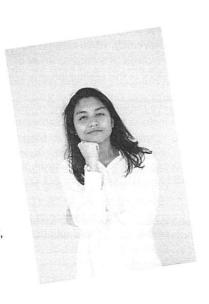
Performer

Synopsis

Four women discover that even in their twenties, growing up female and Malay in Singapore means that you'll never truly be a grown up. To navigate the winds of change, they replay the games they used to play and songs they used to sing. Four friends relive stories of themselves and others like them. Of growing up and growing older, of growing apart and growing (none-the-) wiser, Sau(dara) is a tempestuous retrospective of womanhood. A work-in-progress version of this work was first presented under Centre 42's The Vault programme in 2018.

Producer's notes

June and I began the conversation about centre-to-centre collaboration over two years ago, having met each other at various performing arts meetings over a period of time. Running our respective arts spaces in Malaysian and Singapore, we found common ground in the play "Three Children". The 1988 and 1992 productions of Leow Puay Tin's landmark play were the result of a creative exchange between Malaysian and Singapore theatre companies. The productions were groundbreaking, creating many firsts that we only now recognise as having impacted our theatre scenes. In the spirit of the original exchange, Centre 42 and Five Arts Centre are presenting the exciting project that is "Are You Game, Sau(dara)?", two new works that respond to "Three Children". Revisiting Leow's play in this way documents and promotes the shared histories of our two nations, creates an opportunity to develop new works, and, for Centre 42, enables us to build relationships with our counterparts and theatre-makers across the Causeway. We at Centre 42 are thrilled about the Kuala Lumpur leg of this project because it will be the first time the centre will be co-presenting a work outside of Singapore. And on the following weekend, we are excited to be sharing the results of this cross-Causeway collaboration with our home audience.

Director's notes

When I was first asked to do a performance response for this play as part of its 30th anniversary, I was worried that its reputation may affect how I approach the work.

But a close reading of the script proved to be quite therapeutic in some sense. I felt transported to moments in my childhood, memories with my grandparents in our kampung at Malacca and as a mischievious boy exploring my neighbourhood in Simei.

Devising this artistic response has been quite an adventure. The work has evolved greatly from its October 2018 showing at Centre 42. We welcomed two additional members to the team, Nurul Farahani as a new collaborator and Grace Lee Khoo as dramaturg.

Bringing 4 great female collaborators with great expertise in the various disciplines of theatre, traditional dance and music has been truly a dream!

The original script allowed my collaborators to tap into their intimate experiences and share some of their stories growing up. I for one felt the script made me think about the experiences of girls and women particularly their roles as mothers and in managing the household. The conversations about womanhood also gave each other glimpses into the lives of my collaborators as minority artists in Singapore.

I am grateful to Centre 42 for giving Bhumi Collective this opportunity to reflect upon this iconic work and provide a contemporary response to it. Most of all, we are grateful that we found creative collaborators who were gracious and generous with their stories.
