

# ACT 3 Directors' Notes R. Chandran, Jasmin Samat Simon and Ruby Lim-Yang

Chandran, artistic director: Writing and directing Makanplace have been inspiring challenges.

As the words of the script flowed, one major concern was how to balance Singapore English with standard English. Excessive use of one would have caused terrible distraction, and the other, loss of credibility.

Choreographing the movement of more than 30 actors in, out and about the food centre set was a task in itself. Making it all look natural, well... phew! It's been worth the effort. Watching Makanplace come alive on stage continues to be extremely fulfilling.

**Jasmin, musical director:** We felt at the outset that the choice of music should appeal to most Singaporeans. We decided on a fresh "swing" tempo for the opening number, something that people could sing, snap their fingers, tap their feet, walk and dance to. For the finale, we wanted a "double beat samba", something noisy and rousing.

In between, there is a wide range of music: reggae, bassanova, rock-n-roll.

What about the musical arrangement and instruments? No big band sound or full orchestra sound. Simply the sound of a four-piece band with synthesizers.

My sister, Saedah, made the first soundtrack with just an electronic keyboard. Our good friend Zul, of Tania, made the second soundtrack with real instruments. And the music arrangement in this book, by Khew Sin Sun and Yeong Kim Leng, has also captured the mood of the songs.

Ruby, business director: Why do professional theatre? That's a question I have always been asked. As with other professions, doing theatre requires commitment, resources, dedication, discipline and talent.

We went into professional theatre because, very simply, we were ready to make that commitment. We also wanted to develop interest in theatre among the young.

It has been nearly seven years since we went professional. We are really happy that during that time we have roused a great deal of interest in theatre not only among children and parents, but also young people.

This book is symbolic of what we have always strived for in making theatre accessible. It is hoped that schools, drama groups, individuals will be inspired to do theatre, to achieve their dreams, like we have.

ARE OTHER STALLS OFF-VISION; WE SEE
FOOD BEING BROUGHT IN AND OTHER
HAWKERS WHO COME IN AND GO OFF.

THERE ARE MANY TABLES AND CHAIRS SPREAD ACROSS THE SET AND BEYOND.

PEOPLE COME AND GO, SOME BUYING FOOD, SOME JUST PASSING BY, IN THE BACKGROUND]

#### **SCENE 1**

[AS CURTAINS OPEN WE SEE THE SILHOUETTE OF THE FOOD CENTRE AND THE MANY PEOPLE THERE. THEY ARE STANDING/SITTING MOTIONLESS IN VARIOUS POSES.
TWO PEOPLE COME IN FROM AMONG THE AUDIENCE...]

[ENTER: TWO PERSONS]

1ST PERSON Hey, what time is it?

2ND PERSON It's (time of the performance)

1ST PERSON It's time for makan. Where shall we go?

2ND PERSON To the makanplace!

[LIGHTS, MUSIC ON. EVERYONE BEGINS TO DANCE AND SING, "MAKANPLACE"]

# [MUSIC # 1 MAKANPLACE]

Hey, it's time to celebrate After a movie or on a date You know it's gonna be really great If you go to the makanplace

Give a treat to a friend or two
Have a chat, a rendezvous
When you're happy or when you're blue
Hey, go to the makanplace
(music bridge)

After a morning jog and a run You come here for drinks and makan Have a feast, snack or some fun Here at the makanplace

Hey, it's time to celebrate
After a movie or on a date
You know it's gonna be really great
If you go to the makanplace

Give a treat to a friend or two Have a chat, a rendezvous When you're happy or when you're blue Hey, go to the makanplace

You know it's gonna be really great So, let's go to the makanplace

[AT THE END OF THE SONG PATRONS DRIFT AWAY LEAVING THE HAWKERS TO CLEAR THE MESS LEFT BEHIND... SIEW, WHO HAD BEEN PART OF THE CROWD, HAS JUST COME BACK FROM SCHOOL AND FIDDLES WITH HIS SCHOOLBAG]

#### **LENG**

Siew, go and clear the tables.

#### SIEW

Ma, I just came back from school; let me rest for a while.

## **LENG**

Rest? What, you think you're doing such hard work going to school?

#### **SIEW**

It is hard work. If you don't believe you go to school and see.

#### LENG

Eh, Siew... you think I was born like this. I've been to school and I know.

#### **SIEW**

Last time school was different.

#### LENG

Don't argue; just go and clear the tables... [IGNORES HIM AND PROCEEDS TO CLEAN HER STALL]

#### SIEW

[AS HE WALKS TOWARDS THE TABLES TO CLEAN] Easy way to win an argument; if nothing else to say, she'll just say keep quiet and do as I say... [TO LENG] Now?

[SIEW, PAKCIK, AH TEE, PRATA SELLER (his stall is off-vision) AND RAHIM SING AS THEY CLEAR AND CLEAN UP THE TABLES]

[MUSIC # 2: MAKANPLACE (Reprise)
The Clean Up]

Siew: Hey, after each lunch break

All the plates I have to clear I clean up till my back aches

Or my mum's shouting I will hear

Others: At the end of every meal time

It's time to clear the plates

Do it quick, don't take your time So the next meal won't be late!

# (music bridge)

All:

At the end of every meal time It's time to clear the plates Do it quick, don't take your time So the next meal won't be late!

[ENTER: KUNG]

KUNG

Hello, Madam Leng...

**LENG** 

[A LITTLE NERVOUS] Hello, Mr Kung...

#### KUNG

Madam Leng..., remember the money you borrowed from my boss to renovate your new house? You know, it's five months; you haven't paid back...

#### LENG

Please can you ask him to give me two more weeks...

#### **KUNG**

Two more weeks? ... Already five months you cannot pay back... how to pay in two weeks?

#### LENG

I'll surely pay back the \$600... You know that my life is now difficult... my husband is dead... I have to take care of my son... he goes to school—

#### KUNG

I know your difficulties... that's why we closed one eye for five months.

#### LENG

I just bought the new house... I have a lot of expenses...

#### KUNG

My boss doesn't like people to owe him money for too long.

## **LENG**

I'll pay back, don't worry...

#### KUNG

I don't worry for myself... I worry for you. My boss warned that if you don't pay back, he'll take you to court and close your stall.

#### LENG

I'll work very hard and pay him the money...

**KUNG** 

[PONDERS FOR A MOMENT]... Last chance... two more weeks...

**LENG** 

Thank you...you want to eat something?

**KUNG** 

No, thank you; my friends over there (off stage). Two weeks, Madam Leng...

**LENG** 

Yes, I'll pay you...

**KUNG** 

[CATCHES SIGHT OF SIEW] Your son studying hard?...

**LENG** 

[NODS... TO SIEW] Call uncle...

**SIEW** 

[MUTTERS] ...Uncle...

KUNG

Tell him to study hard... two weeks ... [LEAVES]

[EXIT: KUNG]

RAHIM

[STEPS UP FROM BEHIND STALL] You got problem with the moneylender...

**LENG** 

Mm, mm... yes.

**RAHIM** 

Need help?...

LENG

No, I can manage... just a small amount...

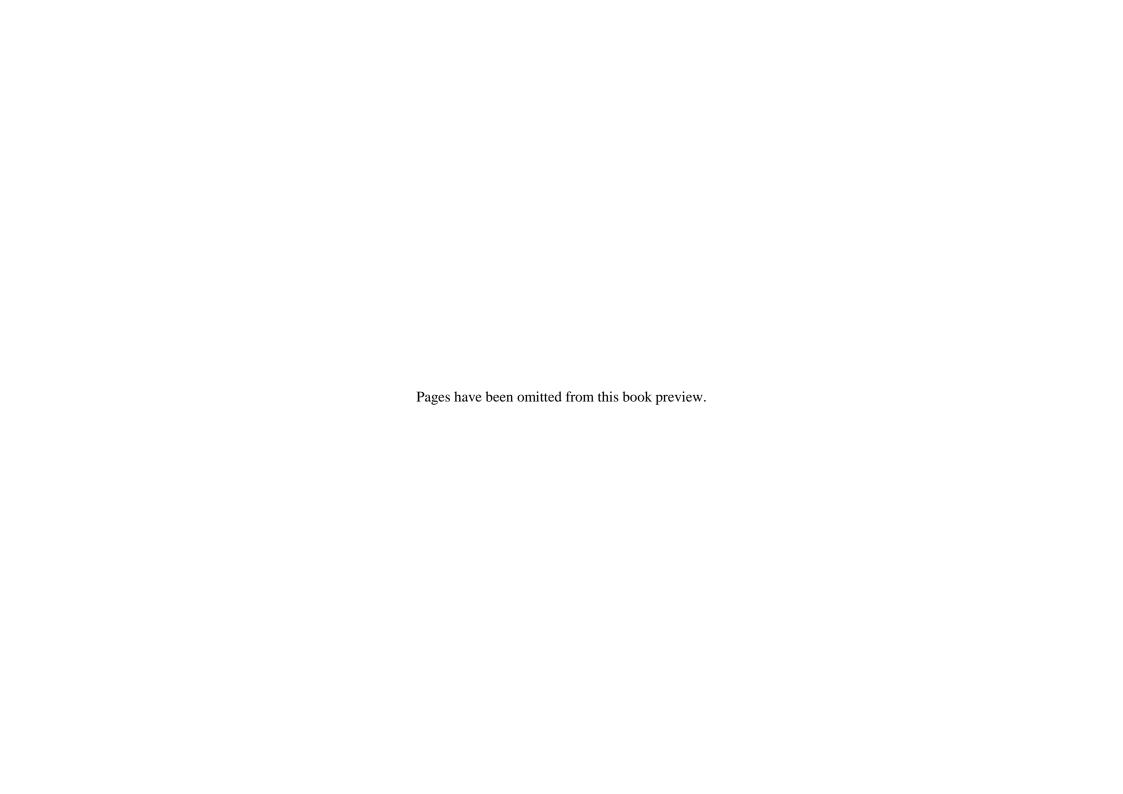
[THEY RETURN TO THEIR STALLS]

[IN A MOMENT ZIL BURSTS INTO THE SCENE WITH SOME CELEBRITY IMPERSONATIONS]

[ENTER: ZIL]

ZIL

[DASHES IN AND WITH A SERIOUS CLARK KENT VOICE ANNOUNCES]
This is a job for Superman... [WHIPS OUT A SARONG, TIES IT AROUND HIS NECK, CAPE-LIKE, AND TAKES "OFF" IN FLIGHT... AFTER A WHILE, LANDS...
THEN REMOVES THE SARONG, FISHES
